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Recognising excellence in trade skills training

The College of Electrical Training recognised under the Star Rating Scheme

Trade skill qualifications are in high demand, but how can students and their parents ensure the skills they gain in the classroom will be recognised by industry and future employers?

The Institute for Trade Skills Excellence today announced the rollout of the Star Rating Scheme. The Scheme will recognise excellence in trade skills training among TAFE and private training providers, with a Star Rating.

The College of Electrical Training (CET) in Perth was one of the first training providers to take part in trials of the Scheme, and has been recognised with a Three Gold Star Rating for Electrical Engineering.

Geoff Hender, Director of the CET said, "As a state of the art provider of Electrical and Telecommunication trade skills development, the recognition we received validates our position as the first choice for training in this industry."

Brian Wexham, Chief Executive Officer of The Institute for Trade Skills Excellence thanked the CET for participating in the trials and congratulated them on an exemplary outcome.

"The Scheme aims to recognise high performing registered training providers such as the College of Electrical Training, and help individual schools and faculties understand exactly what their clients want from their training.

"It is a national initiative which will help promote and advance the quality and relevance of vocational and technical training for the trades in Australia," said Mr Wexham.

The Scheme recognises and awards high performing registered training providers with a One Gold Star, Two Gold Star or Three Gold Star rating, with Three Gold Stars being the highest level of recognition.

"The Star Rating Scheme is an industry driven initiative and has been developed by The Institute and industry to provide a platform that will deliver the vocational training outcomes required to meet their needs," said Mr Wexham.



“The Scheme will also make it easier for students and their parents to ascertain which registered training providers have been recognised at an industry level, within their field of interest.

“Employers will also be able to assess the quality of trade skills training that graduates hold from each registered training organisation rated within the Star Rating Scheme,” said Mr Wexham.

Throughout August and September, a number of registered training organisations took part in trials of the Star Rating Scheme.

“The results of the trials indicate that we have a very high standard of trade skills training in Australia, and this should be recognised,” said Mr Wexham.

Mr Hender supported the Star Rating Scheme and said it was an effective way of addressing Australia’s skills shortage.

“The College of Electrical Training was pleased to be able to support the Star Rating Scheme for The Institute for Trade Skills Excellence.

“We found the process valuable as a source of internal professional development, and a great tool to maintain excellence for our clients.

“During this critical labour shortage period we welcome worthwhile initiatives – such as this new Scheme that supports industry, and has the ability to increase student numbers,” said Mr Hender.

The Star Rating Scheme:

The Star Rating Scheme will identify the very best training providers, industry by industry. It is a way to enable employers, career counsellors, potential students, and parents to distinguish excellence in trade training by evaluating training providers. Industry areas within RTOs which apply will receive either a One Gold Star, Two Gold Star, or Three Gold Star rating to indicate that they achieve excellent results for their clients.

It's also about creating a better informed market which will expect high quality, and thereby help to lift the quality bar on training.

The Star Rating Scheme focuses on the following eight areas of skill shortage:

- Automotive
- Building and Construction
- Electrical
- Hospitality and Personal Services
- Manufacturing
- Metals and Engineering
- Mineral Resources
- Rural and Farming

Evaluations are carried out against three broad criteria that were developed in partnership with businesses that employ tradespeople. The evaluation process includes an initial self evaluation by the relevant faculty or school, followed by a site visit to schools or faculties who demonstrate potential to achieve a One Gold Star, Two Gold Star or Three Gold Star rating.
